Dear Chairs and Ranking Members:

As Congress considers the Fiscal Year 2024 Appropriations Bills for Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies, Energy and Water Development, and State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs, we ask you to continue to provide robust federal funding for programs supporting the Lake Champlain basin. Lake Champlain provides significant environmental, recreational, historic, and educational value to our region. We have a responsibility to expand federal support for the Lake so our constituents can benefit for years and generations to come.

Work in the Lake Champlain basin is funded through several different federal programs. One key funding stream is **the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Lake Champlain Program**. This funding is used to address invasive species, nutrient and toxic substances pollution, conservation needs, and public education around these topics.

Meanwhile, financial support from the **Heritage Partnership Program** has allowed state partners to promote educational and recreational opportunities around the lake. Together, these programs teach people of all ages about the history and science of the lake and region.

In addition, the **Lake Champlain Sea Lamprey Control Program** supports efforts to counter the impact of parasitic sea lampreys, an invasive species that threatens larger fish in Lake Champlain. Over the past 30 years, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) has worked with agencies in New York and Vermont to develop and implement this highly successful program. The program has helped reduce mortality rates for salmon, lake trout, and other species of concern. The USFWS must have the funds it needs to continue this work.

Finally, the **Great Lakes Fishery Commission** also plays an important role in promoting science, facilitating interstate, intrastate, and international partnerships, and addressing aquatic

invasive species (AIS). In addition to the sea lamprey, Lake Champlain is home to 51 known AIS, with many more found in surrounding bodies of water that pose a risk to the lake. Research at the **U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Aquatic Plant Control Laboratory** supports these efforts to manage AIS.

Given the importance of these federal programs to the Lake Champlain watershed, we ask that the following accounts be funded in order to support their essential work:

- **Lake Champlain Basin Program** [Section 120 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act]
 - Subcommittee: Interior
 - Agency or Account: Title II, Environmental Protection Agency/ Environmental Programs and Management/Geographic Programs/Lake Champlain
 - Amount: \$35,000,000, an increase of \$10,000,00 from the FY23 enacted level
- **Heritage Partnership Program**
 - Subcommittee: Interior
 - Agency or Account: Title I, Department of the Interior, National Park Service, national Recreation and Preservation/Heritage Partnership Program
 - Amount: \$30,693,600, an increase of \$1,461,600 from the FY23 enacted level
- **Lake Champlain Sea Lamprey Control**
 - Subcommittee: Interior
 - Agency or Account: Title I/Department of the Interior/Fish and Wildlife Service/Resource Management/Fish and Aquatic Conservation/Aquatic habitat and species conservation
 - Amount: \$858,900, an increase of \$40,900 from the FY23 enacted level
- **Great Lakes Fishery Commission (State & Foreign Operations Bill)**
 - Subcommittee: SFOPS
 - Agency or Account: Title 1 – Department of State and Related Agency/International Commissions/International Fisheries Commissions
 - Project: Lake Champlain and Lake Memphremagog
 - Report Language: “The Committee recommends \$50,000,000 for the Great Lakes Fishery Commission, including funds for the Commission to address risks to its programs, fund its infrastructure strategy, control the invasive sea lamprey, conduct science and research to aid cross-border fishery management, and control grass carp in the Great Lakes. The amount also includes \$10,000,000 for the Lake Champlain and Lake Memphremagog basins, \$500,000 for the Lake Memphremagog fishery, and \$1,000,000 to address grass carp in the Great Lakes. The Committee also supports the efforts of the GLFC to combat other invasive carp species outside of the Great Lakes Basin.”
 - The FY23 enacted level was \$50,000,0000
- **U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Aquatic Plant Control Laboratory**
 - Subcommittee: Energy and Water Development

- Agency or Account: Title I, /Corps of Engineers/Construction/Remaining Items/Aquatic Plant Control Program
- Amount: \$10,000,000, an increase of \$4,000,000 from the FY23 enacted level
